Extract from the Wellington Journal 15<sup>th</sup> May 1915:

## LIEUT. HAZLEDINE KILLED

To the long list of fallen Shropshire heroes must be added this week the name of Lt.John T.Hazledine, 4<sup>th</sup> Royal Welsh Fusiliers (T.F.), one of Shrewsbury's most esteemed citizens, and a grandson of a former Mayor of the borough. The late Lieut. Hazledine on the outbreak of war was in business in Castle Street, as a land agent and surveyor, which he promptly closed and joined the 4<sup>th</sup> Royal Welsh Fusiliers as Second-Lieut., in which his friend, Captain W.N.Withers, was already serving, and the regiment the most distinguished in the Territorial Service, was one of the first to go to the front, where they have since covered themselves with glory. Lieut. Hazledine was wounded about two months ago, came home for a short stay only, and was soon back in the trenches, and now comes the sad news of his death. The deceased officer was a son of Mrs. Vaughan, Burlton Hall, near Shrewsbury, and brother of the Rev. W.C.Hazledine, vicar of Ash, Whitchurch.
